For Library and Archives Canada (LAC), as for its Friends, 2017 lived up to all our expectations. We wanted the 150th anniversary of Confederation to provide Canadians with an opportunity to reconnect with their leading memory institution, and we were not disappointed.

Our open houses were attended by 1,335 visitors at 395 Wellington on June 3rd and 4th, and by 1,836 visitors at the

Preservation Centre in Gatineau on July 9th and 10th. On July 1st, 2,800 visitors walked through our doors on Wellington Street to view the *Who Do We Think*



We Are? exhibition and to partake in the giant birthday cake provided by Friends of LAC, an initiative of Grete Hale.

Throughout the year, the Friends worked side by side with us at some 60 events that restored the status of our building in the vicinity of Parliament Hill as a cultural hub.

In addition, thanks to the donations of the Friends, LAC acquired two precious pieces in 2017. First, a painting by Mary Riter Hamilton entitled *Canadian Rockies Sketch* (1912); and second, a book published in 1785, *Direction pour la guerison du mal de la Baie St. Paul*, which was the first medical book published in Canada.

In recognition of the invaluable contributions by the Friends of LAC, it seemed natural to highlight the decisive role of their president, Marianne Scott, in a tangible manner. This is why last April 20th, the boardroom where the Friends of LAC hold their meetings at 395 Wellington was named the "Marianne Scott Room."

I know that all of the Friends of LAC welcome this tribute to Marianne. I hope they also feel personally honoured.

Georgia Ellis, who originally set up the Friends office at my request, was unable to continue as a regular volunteer because of some health issues. She has now moved to Smiths Falls to be closer to family. I remain very grateful to Georgia for accepting the challenge that the startup of the Friends' office posed more than 25 years ago. We will be having a reception in the spring so we can express our appreciation for all Georgia has done for the Friends.

In closing, my sincere thanks to all of you for your continued support of the Friends and through us, of Library and Archives Canada.

VOLUNTEER APPRECIATION DAY


